## Cambria Run on North County Backroads

The run to Cambria was an easy fun run through the back roads of the north county to Cambria. Five Jeeps made up the group for the run on Saturday the 9th of September. We met at the park in Santa Margarita at 9:00am attending this run was Matt N, Brian T, Glen and Jan L along with Randy and Margaret P. And myself Dennis V. I forgot to write down what everyone was driving, but I can tell you there was one Red, one White, one Silver, one Black and one Orange well equipped Jeeps ready to hit the road. We left Santa Margarita around 9:15am and headed North to Paso Robles driving slowly waiting for Brian to catch up to the group as he was still bolting things on to his Jeep as we were leaving. 


we had been waiting for all summer. I thought about the people in the club that didn't come along, but not for long. We were having too much fun.

It was cold during the night. My guess it was in the low 40s, the days where




