Member Rigs: From Zero to Jeeper's Jamboree in 6 Months

For the lack of anything better to write about on such a short schedule for my first newsletter, I figured I'd continue the idea of taking a look at a member and their rig. With so little time to get this issue ready (not to mention trying to figure out what I'd like it to look like), I might as well do my own (I've already got lots of pictures of it and this year has been pretty amazing).

For the last couple of years whenever my buddy Mike G and I got to do fun stuff away from our houses, it usually involved going for a ride in his Red CJ-7. That was all fine and dandy until he converted it to a two seater for the heavy duty Jeep runs. With Matt a usual passenger, that left me looking for a way to keep up.

Mike had a great idea, I could buy a Jeep! At first I figured that I'd buy an older used one and then we'd modify it so it could do what a Jeep should do. It became clear fairly quickly that the cost of the modifications and repairs would soon come close to the cost of a fairly new one. Then we found the Rubicon down at Ted Miles' dealership!

After a little bit of haggling and a lot of "Am I really sure" (this was going to be the most I'd ever spent on a vehicle before), I was the proud new owner of a 2004 Jeep Wrangler TJ Rubicon!

Now luckily for me and my pocketbook, the Jeep came with an aftermarket 3-1/2 inch ProComp lift, Micky Thompson Wheels and all sorts of Rubicon extras (Dana 44s front and rear, Front and rear lockers, 4:1 first gear, 4:1 low range and 4.10 differentials). The drive train gave me about a 65:1 final drive for crawling.

Now that I had a Jeep, Mike felt that we needed to make some changes. Over the next several months the front and rear tube bumpers were replaced with Warn bumpers and the addition of a Warn 9500ti Winch. The tube steps and stock Rubicon rocker covers were replaced with some really nice Hansen Rock Sliders. A Tuffy overhead console was added to house the CB and a Best-Top Safari top was made a new optional top to be used in place of the stock hardtop. I was quickly discovering what JEEP stood for (Just Empty Every Pocket).

Now what to do about tires. The ones on it were quickly wearing out. Goodyears were my first choice (Mark likes 'em), but thanks to military activity, they aren't available for now. So I went ahead and got Mickey Thompson Baja MTZ's. They looked neat and went on a few weeks before the Jamboree (which is a whole different part of this story).

My first off-road run with the Jeep

was a night run with the club on the Las Chichas trail. Fairly tame and not a big deal except for the worn tires I had on at the time.

The second run was with Mike G and Mark B as we drove the Pine Mountain Trail all the way to the top of the stair steps in June. My passenger for that run was Kevin C. By this time I had already registered for the Jeeper's Jamboree and his coaching and knowledge of the Rubicon Trail guided through what turned out to be a fairly challenging run for my second run. Also go my first body scratches as we trudged through brush.

The third run was the Garcia Ridge club cleanup run in early July with the new tires. Fairly minor run after Pine Mountain, but I did chicken out on the play area when I saw Eric sitting with his front end pitched up and rear wheels digging a trench just below the top rock.

Then in late July we trailered our Jeeps and headed for Placerville to drop off the tow rigs and trailers and hot foot it to Georgetown. We quickly registered, got something to eat and then high tailed it to Loon Lake just after Sundown. We slept along the side of the dirt road that night.

We were awoke at 5:30 AM Thursday morning to the Santa Margarita group heading for the beginning of the trail. Following Keith M we some how managed to make our way to the front in a hurry with barely time to air down and disconnect the sway bar. We then started a nine hour trek that would cover seven and a half miles of some of the most beautiful country I've seen in a while!

Just when I was starting to get used to the continuous terror of almost

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destroying what I had spent the last few months pouring money into, the Jeep slide sideways into a rock and I sustained the only trail damaged, a cracked rim at the tire bead that, while looking horrible at the time, held air for two months before I replaced the wheel and slowly rounded back out.

We rolled into camp at about 4:00 PM and set up our camp site and spent the next two days relaxing and looking at everyone else's rigs. For the money you get good grub on the trail and in camp, you're just sharing it with about 1,200 other people, some of who really like to party.

At 4:30 AM Sunday morning we broke camp and headed out at about 6:00 AM only to get stuck in a half mile long traffic jam to Cadillac Hill.

This was the beginning of a four hour, nine mile, drive out to the air up station. A few more miles to Homewood for Lunch and we were off the Jamboree along with my Souvenir poster, bag and stickers to show for it.

After lunch we took off for Placer-

ville to shower, eat and sleep before heading back home.

I think what got me by during this event was great coaching by Mark, Mike, Kevin and Keith, I also watched the Jeep ahead of me (usually Keith or Mike) and made adjustments for differences in vehicle structures as we went along. My basic rules provided by Mike were:

- If a rock has a scuff mark on it, put a tire on it.
- Pay attention to those around you and watch what they do that works.
- Get to camp in one piece; no showing off!
